Functional	Having a special activity, purpose, or task.	
Design Criteria	Really important goals that must be achieved in order for a project to be successful.	
Thread a needle	To insert thread through the eye of a needle.	
Running Stitch	A line of small even stitches which run back and forth through the fabric without overlapping.	
Back stitch	Stitching or a stitch in which the thread is doubled back on the preceding stitch.	
Anderson Shelter	Half buried in the ground with earth heaped on top to protect people from bomb blasts during World War Two.	
Recipe	A set of instructions for preparing a particular dish, including a list of the ingredients required.	
Rationing	Allow each person to have only a fixed amount of something.	

Lavender bag



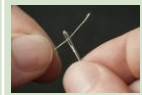
Lavender bags were used to fragrance clothes and materials in WW2.



1. Cut out your fabric for your lavender bag.



2. Thread some cotton through a needle and knot the end.



3. Stitch the edges of the material together.



4. Fill the bag with lavender.



5. Sew up the top of the bag.



Rationing in WW2



Every person in Britain was given a ration book. They had to register and buy their food from their chosen shops. There were no supermarkets, so people had to visit several different shops to buy meat, vegetables, bread and other goods. When people wanted to buy some food, the items they bought were crossed off in their ration book by the shopkeeper. Some foods were not available all year round.

Sprouting broccoli is ready in Spring.

Spinach grows all year round.

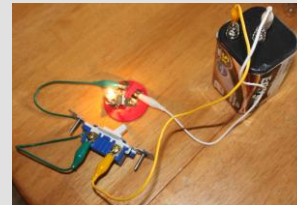
Potatoes are harvested in Summer to Winter.
